





## **GLOBAL MISSION PROJECT**

Reaching the Javanese, Brazilian and Spanish speaking in Suriname **By Steven Tulp**

As many already know, Suriname is a plural society with various ethnic groups, languages, customs and religions. Of course, these demographics cannot be neglected when it comes to evangelism. The church in Suriname has not been very successful in reaching people of all ethnic and religious backgrounds. Various efforts have been made to work with Amerindians, East Indians, Javanese, Maroons, people from the interior, immigrants from Haiti, Brazil and Spanish speaking countries. Also reaching Hindus and Muslims is a priority since they make up 22.3% and 13.9% respectively of the Suriname population. There is still work to do with the upper class and centers of influence.

In relation to the immigrants from Brazil and Spanish speaking countries, Pastor Steven Tulp is in the frontline of the work in this community because of his ability to speak the language since he studied theology in Brazil. The name of this community is Esperança Viva (Living Hope) and they meet at the Mission office. Their strategy consists of four pillars: small group, evangelistic programs, Bible classes and talent-based ministries. These are gates to get people into the community of disciples. The main process is discipleship through communion with God, building relationships and a mission oriented focus. To be more effective we need a community center or a center of influence 11

to offer various low barrier services (such as English classes, healthy cooking, assisting with the immigration process, baby day care and other services) to build meaningful relationships with the Brazilian community in Suriname and to offer Bible studies.

Another focus group that recently took a more sustainable growth approach which has great potential, is the work among the Javanese. Since impact 2019 and earlier, the work under this group commenced and it continued in the background. Brother Fred Dipotaroeno (a SDA Javanese brother from the Elim Church) conducted small group prayer meetings with his former fellow church members on Wednesdays. This group has been growing and souls have been added. Recently, pastor Tulp held an evangelistic campaign and almost his entire immediate family accepted Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour. They have been inserted into this group and every other week on Thursdays they hold small group meetings at the house of a family member in the group. The father of Pastor Tulp always looks forward to these meetings and his prayer is that one day his father and another sister will also accept Jesus. We pray that this group continues to grow and to serve the more than 70.000 Javanese people in Suriname.

(Continued from Page 2) Viewing the comments on the live chat on Youtube and hearing from people who watched on TV who called for more information, we can conclude that the seed was sown and God will bring in the sheaves when they are ripe. During the series, among the visitors, the father, mother, eldest sister, niece and nephew of the evangelist were present to initially support him and by the grace of God, almost the whole family accepted Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour and were baptized on the last day of the campaign. In total, we had four baptisms and one person who entered the church through profession of faith. To continue to nurture the newly baptized, they were inserted into a small, growing group with Javanese members who hold meetings every other Thursday. This was the first public evangelistic series Pastor Steven Tulp conducted after completing his theology studies in Brazil and we hope many more will follow. ## New Records Set at CARU Bible Connection finals, 2021

For the third consecutive year Xabisa Hamilton of the Guyana Conference of Seventh-day Adventists emerged the winner of the Caribbean Union's Bible Connection, Moses Award Finals. The hattrick is a record performance as no other participant in the history of the program has accomplished this feat. Further, it is also the fourth consecutive win for the Guyana Youth Ministries Department as Tandika Dean was the winner in the year immediately before Hamilton burst on the scene.

Hamilton, the twenty year old, soft-spoken lass, is an active member of the Sophia church in Georgetown and also a University of Guyana, biology student. She floated to the top of the list to clinch victory in the final round after trailing in second place for the two preceding rounds. Keith George, a first-timer and school teacher from the Tobago Mission, who led the way for the early rounds, seemed poised to break the Guyanese winning streak but in the crucial final round he faded into second spot as Hamilton surged past to take the top spot. In the end, only ten points, the value of a single question, separated the two as George finished on 495 points and Hamilton on 505 points. Melony McNichols, another first-timer from SVG Mission, was third with 425 points (43 under "correct" should have been reflected in table on page 8).

True Perspective of Adventist Community Services


Contemporary Ways of Witnessing through ACS

Indeed it was a seamless and inspirational session which saw the election of the following:



The ordination speaker, the beloved president of our Caribbean Union, was profound and relevant is his sermon, Called To Represent Permanently. Dr. Tobias admonished, "Being called to be a minister is indeed a unique privilege." Quoting Gospel Workers page 20, he stated, "The minister stands as God's mouthpiece to the people, and in thought, in word, in act, he is to represent his Lord. When Moses was chosen as the messenger of the covenant, the word given him was, 'be thou for the people to Godward' (Exod 18:19). Today, God chooses men and women as He chose Moses, to be His messengers, and heavy is the woe resting on the one who dishonors his holy calling, or lowers the standard set for him in the life and labors of the Son of God."

Dr. Tobias continued to challenge the ministers. "I want you to understand clearly that you are called and ordained to represent Christ permanently," he said, and as he focused on piety and the quality of being religious or reverent, he exhorted, "Encountering the Master guarantees the experience of piety. Piety means reverence for God and love of His character; loving obedience to His will and earnest devotion to His service. A common element of piety is humility. Piety can be either genuine, in that it springs from spiritual piety, or false, in that it is an attempt to exhibit the signs of piety for their own sake, or for some other reason." These exhortations were profound indeed.

All three Pastors gave their responses, expressing gratitude to family, friends, pastors/mentors, the churches that they have pastored and the ones they are currently managing; all who contributed to their growth and development.

They were welcomed into the fellowship of the SDA pastorate by President Dermoth Baptiste and by Shepherdess Director for the Caribbean Union, Sister Linda Tobias.

Pastor Cain joined the pastorate on February 1 2013. He served in 3 districts under supervision

## THE ASH SQUAD

The volcanic eruptions in the islands of St. Vincent and the Grenadines affected those islands in significant ways. However, not only these islands were inundated with ash fall and faced subsequent challenges, but her closest island neighbour, Barbados, suffered tremendously. The ash fall brought the entire country to a standstill with the closure of the airport, schools, and businesses and eventually occasioned a national shutdown. At the end, we were pleased with the level of volunteerism which allowed us to clean six (6) streets and one (1) community court. We saw the need and God supported our efforts. We sought to assist, using our hands and our feet, but more importantly, our hearts, to help individuals and serve our community.


## ANDREWS UNIVERSITY NAMES ITS CHURCH HISTORY SUITE AFTER GRENADIAN BORN USC ALUMNUS

On September 25th, 2021, the Church History Suite at the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary (SATS) at Andrews University (AU) was named after the very influential, retired professor and pastor, Dr. Walter Baxter Theophilus Douglas. Positioned in a conspicuous place of honour on the upper floor of the building, is an artist's portrait of the man who in 1972, became the first person of colour to join the teaching faculty at AU. Dr. Douglas served with distinction as a scholar and member of teaching faculty at the SATS and in several other roles at AU for thirty-five years.

In his acceptance speech at the naming ceremony, Douglas, an alumnus of Caribbean Union College, Andrews University, McGill University and McMaster University chose to single out Caribbean Union College (CUC) - now the University of the Southern Caribbean (USC) - as the veritable point of original inspiration for the distinguished life of service he has led.

Walter Douglas - at the insistence of his mother came to the campus of Caribbean Training College (the immediate institutional forerunner to CUC) in the early 1950s from his native Grenada. He was an impressionable, eager, and intellectually curious sixteen-year-old. His studies on the campus prepared him for the gospel ministry in the first instance, and also laid a solid foundation for his illustrious career as a scholar, consultant, servant-leader and the many other interesting things he has done with his life.

Douglas graduated from CUC as part of the very impressive class of 1958 and entered a brief stint of pastoral ministry in Port of Spain, Trinidad. His ambitions quickly took him to AU where he completed a baccalaureate degree in theology. He soon returned to CUC in 1963 as a member of its teaching faculty. Later in that year, he married Yvonne Sebro, an alumna of CUC and the daughter of Pastor Frederick A. Sebro - one of the first male students at East Caribbean Training School (the earliest formation of USC). Yvonne has been his supporter and partner in ministry, parenthood and life for almost fifty-eight years - and yes, they had a CUC campus wedding. **(Continued next page)**

In 1964, Walter Douglas was one of quite a few youthful members of CUC's teaching faculty to leave for North America to further their studies. He returned to Andrews University and there, as an exceptional graduate student, he left such an impression that soon after he moved to Canada for further graduate study at McGill University, he was invited by then AU president, Dr. Richard Hammill, to join the teaching faculty at the seminary. Douglas negotiated a postponed acceptance in order to complete his studies at McGill. In 1972, he took up what by then was a three-year old invitation and joined the teaching faculty at the seminary. He specialized in church history and the history of religion. He later added the emerging field of multiculturalism and diversity studies to his academic and professional skillset and was the founder and first director of The Institute for Diversity and Multiculturalism at AU.

In the privileged position of professor at the seminary – the epicenter of Adventist thought, research, scholarship and pastoral training – Dr. Douglas immensely impacted the world church directly and through his former students. For seminarians, being taught by Dr. Douglas became a rite of passage. The full stretch of his influence there will only be known when the records of heaven are unsealed. As for the more measurable, his exceptional work as a teacher and scholar at AU, earned him the John Nevins Andrews Medallion in 1993 – the superlative award AU reserves for its best scholars.

The demands of academic and professional responsibilities did not ameliorate the burden of his call to pastoral ministry and the pulpit. He was one the founders of the All Nations Seventh-day Adventist Church in Berrien Springs, Michigan, USA and was its senior pastor from 1980 to 2004. Even after his retirement from AU, Dr. Douglas continued active pastoral ministry in Florida. Beyond the cloisters of the denominational work, Dr. Douglas' expertise and body of work in the field of multiculturalism and diversity studies brought him many special assignments in various parts of the world. One of the most memorable of these assignments for him, was his call to participate in an interim transitional government in his birthplace Grenada, after the fall of the People's Revolutionary Government and the US led military intervention there in 1983.

In a reflective conversation with Dr. Colwick Wilson, the current president of USC, Dr. Douglas expressed thanks to God for the privilege and opportunity of spending thirty-five years in service to Andrews University and the world. He considered it an opportunity to represent CUC/USC at that level and admitted that it was an honour for him to do so. He added that no man is an island and as such, his success is tied directly to the University of the Southern Caribbean. It was at CUC/USC that he experienced a call to ministry; it was there that he found Jesus; and it was there that he found his wife. Dr. Douglas even somehow managed to 'grand-father' the impact of CUC/USC into his explanation of the success of his three very accomplished adult children. He argues with a persuasive conviction that the blessings that he and his wife received from CUC/USC translated into opportunities for their children to be educated at some of the finest universities in North America and to experience outstanding successes in their own careers. Their children are Vonda, a pathologist; Derek, an attorney, university administrator and former aide to former US President Barack Obama; and La Vonne, a clinical psychologist.

The CARU constituency extends heartfelt congratulations to Dr. Walter B.T. Douglas on his most recent honour and embraces the inspiration and pride it carries for the people of Grenada and the Caribbean.

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
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



With severe water shortages that lasted months in Barbados, the Community Services Department got in gear to bring relief to persons affected in those areas in Barbados. Even during the rainy season there are some communities where consistent water shortage is a reality. The quest to measure a nation's president's initial days in office began rather memorably with US President Franklin Delano Roosevelt in 1933. He began his presidency during a very challenging time in American history; the Great Depression. He coined the "first 100 days in office" which he began by launching many critical initiatives to bring relief to America's devastating economic crisis. This Americanism that has become a ubiquitous metric of the early impact of leaders, has its original association with what for the US – and possibly the world - became presidential greatness.

In July of this year, the Board of Trustees of the University of the Southern Caribbean appointed Dr. Colwick Mervyn Wilson as president of the university. His appointment, like Franklin D. Roosevelt's, comes at a very challenging and memorable time in history; this time, it is during the COVID-19 pandemic.

So, just as many presidents after Roosevelt have been assessed for their likelihood of a successful administration, the first 100 days of Dr. Wilson's presidency are presented here as a means of sharing his initial strategies that will ultimately become part of his legacy.

Dr. Colwick Wilson was born in Guyana and is a proud alumnus of CUC/USC. He studied theology

as a student at CUC/USC and following a stint of pastoral practice in the Guyana Conference, went on to the US where he completed a Master of Arts degree in sociology from the University of Michigan, a Master of Arts degree in leadership and counseling from Eastern Michigan University, and then a PhD in sociology from the University of Michigan.

Dr. Wilson is married to Dr. Deleise Cole-Wilson and together they have two adult daughters Chidinma Wilson and Corliss Wilson.

His appointment to USC was received with delight and anticipation. Though, it was the first time in the history of the ninety-four-year-old institution, a presidential appointee was interviewed, introduced and installed remotely.

In his position as President Elect, while still in the US, the Guyana American Missionary Endeavour hosted a virtual event, "Let's Talk with President Wilson" that revealed enthusiastic national, regional and international support for his election. This was on April 24th 2021.

Thereafter, Dr. Wilson engaged in many programmes before physically arriving on the main campus. These included the commissioning and dedication ceremony for the new University Auditorium and home of the School of Nursing and Allied Health on May 26, as well as the eighty-eighth graduation exercises from June 18-20, where he participated as President Elect and guest of honour.

Dr. Wilson officially assumed duty as President on July 1st, 2021.

From his first day in office, Dr. Wilson has kept quite a hectic schedule of internal and external engagements with stakeholders that has included appearances at alumni activities, fundraising ventures, the annual Colloquium and quite a number of introductory meetings and courtesy calls with leaders in denominational, state and civic organizations.

He has resurrected the celebration of Founders' Day at USC and this year the commemoration was themed "Celebrating our Legacy: Reconnect, Recommit, Reimagine". This programme was truly a strategic outreach that allowed USC to reconnect with many alumni family and friends who have become ambassadors who exemplify USCian men and women across the globe. Founders' Day 2021 also saw the launch of Dr. Wilson's "Get on the Bus Fundraising Campaign". Drawing on the metaphor of a Caribbean bus ride outing, the campaign appeals to all supporters of our university to purchase actual tickets and take an excursion with us to a stronger university that is enabled to meaningfully improve value proposition to the church and its young people and to the Caribbean region.

Dr. Wilson has also set his eyes on the historic milestone of USC's 100th anniversary celebration, due to take place in 2027. That anniversary celebration, he envisions, will be unlike any in USC's history.

Since Dr. Wilson's arrival on the main USC campus in Maracas, St. Joseph, Trinidad and Tobago, he has hosted the President's Convocation. This was held in September and showcased never before seen snippets of USC's deans' acting skills and creative prowess. The President's Convocation was memorably encapsulated "Living Courageously: Faithfully and Fearlessly". His training in hermeneutics and experience in motivation shone brightly.

Dr. Wilson has met with the Honourable Esmond Forde, Member of Parliament for the constituency of Tunapuna, and Deputy Speaker of the House of Representatives who paid him a courtesy visit on September 30<sup>th</sup>, 2021. This was an introductory gesture to ensure the partnership and cordial relationship between the university and its neighbouring constituency.

On his 100th day in office, Dr. Wilson met with the USC Faculty Senate, the elected representatives of the faculty, and recounted important milestones.

He has held town meetings with internal stakeholders including deans, chairs, faculty and staff. He says he needed to meet with and listen to his constituents. He has begun an audit of some staff to ascertain the demography of campus personnel under his care. He has met individually with Board of Trustees members, as a means of forging closer ties. He has engaged denominational stakeholders, the local pastors of the South Caribbean Conference and presidents of conferences and missions within the Caribbean Union. This outreach to those in the Caribbean Union is to initiate spiritual support and foster engagements for present and future initiatives. He has also set his radar on the Inter-American Division and the research opportunities and partnerships available through such linkages. He has begun talks with corporate stakeholders, such as Nestle Caribbean and academic institutions such as Howard University with a view to future collaborations. He has also strategically engaged state officials in various governments of CARICOM building-out his field of co-operation and relational resources in the region. The President has commenced alumni outreach and has also sourced sponsors who have already vowed financial support to USC. Additionally, Dr. Wilson has even made overtures to overseas sponsors who may have no specific links to USC, or who may never have donated to the university before.

Dr. Wilson often refers to USC as "Miracle Valley" [his term], where miracles still do take place. President Wilson sat for an interview in mid-October to discuss his vision and faculty matters and provided some intriguing insights.

His real reason for leaving his distinguished career in the US to return to his alma mater, is rooted in a history of prioritizing Christian education and wanting to give back to the church and young people. He does admit he was encouraged by some close to him to apply for the position, with hopes of closer collaboration and lucrative partnerships with sister institutions.

When asked about seeming intentionality in engaging all stakeholders, and what he would like to achieve for faculty by the end of his presidency, Dr. Wilson has a bucket list including:

i. faculty development

ii. faculty contributing to national and regional discourses in the media on topical issues

iii. faculty earning more attractive salaries with incremental annual wage increases

iv. faculty participation in governance and operations of the university that is meaningful

v. health and well-being of faculty and all employ-

Note, Dr. Wilson also has great plans for students, alumni, the various extension sites and international stakeholders too. He shared his views of the COVID-19 era and believes the greatest downside is the loss of life of so many people around the world, as well as the long-term health effects. Sadly, the President has lost many loved ones to the virus. He sees the greatest blessing of the pandemic as the technological adaptations from which all have been able to benefit. He admitted that what he most wished he had brought from the US to the campus are resources such as computers and lab equipment.

As a leader, he now sees his greatest weakness as his previous experience. That has affected his expectations and assumptions, but as president of his alma mater, his greatest asset is his resilience. He is not fearful of the challenges and always strives for personal and professional growth.

So far, Dr. Wilson most appreciates USC's many Christian employees who are committed to SDA education. He describes them as caring, decent and passionate. He loves the prevalence of prayer on the campus and treasures the growth of the institution since his time as a student. The slower pace of Caribbean life is tremendously appealing to him, as well as the culturally inbred "liming" trait of Trinbagonians.

As the USC President's "first 100 days in office" has been shared, we do trust and pray that the inspiring and responsive leadership style evident in President Wilson will continue to advance the Lord's commission. His early initiatives portend a positive trajectory. Do continue to pray for the growth and success of this president and may God continue to lead him as he leads. Also, do continue to support USC by your donations, attendance or sponsorship.

He regularly talked to God, submitted to his wisdom, and in times of crisis, turned to God for guidance, and God always supplied his needs.

Admittedly, Moses faltered at times. In Exodus 17, the Israelites were camped in Rephidim, but the Bible says there was no water there. The people were thirsty and they complained to Moses, "Why did you bring us up out of Egypt to make us and our children and livestock die of thirst?" Moses felt in this instance that the Israelites were speaking out against his leadership. Yes, He recognized that they were challenging God too but he could not help but feel the loneliness that can come with leadership. He cried out to the Lord, "What am I to do with these people? They are almost ready to stone me."

God miraculously provided the water they needed. When you think about it, isn't it ironic where they were camping at the time? Israel was camping in Rephidim. The very name Rephidim means one who offers support. It is always fascinating to me how names are used in the Bible to convey certain messages. They were complaining but the very place where they were, assured them that God, who had delivered them from Egypt and who was leading them, was the one who would support them and satisfy their needs. Where are you camped today? Regardless of where we are, we can praise God that He does not lead us to a place without His support.

But imagine what happens after their needs were satisfied and their thirst was quenched? The Amalekites came and attacked the Israelites at Rephidim - the enemy attacked! Isn't it still like that today? We work hard to reach our goals, we reap success and then someone tries to take it from us, or tries to discredit us, or tries to make us out to be less of a person.

Moses laid out the battle strategy and gave Joshua the instructions to "choose some of our men and go out to fight the Amalekites." But that was not all. Moses also said, "Tomorrow I will stand on top of the hill with the staff of God in my hands." What a battle strategy! Boots on the ground but Moses standing with a staff in his hand? What does his standing on a hill with a staff in his hands have anything to do with winning a battle? Interestingly enough, Moses took the high ground, literally. But what was he doing there? He was praying.

- Brethren, when the enemy brings its low attacks on us, we too need to take the high ground. Go to God in prayer.
- We are not called on to fight with swords and shields but we must get on our knees. As we prepare to break the glass ceiling, we are encouraged to take the high ground in prayer but we also need soldiers on the front line of this fight.
- Moses held up the rod as a banner to encourage the soldiers and it also served as an appeal to God. Our banner is the way we live in our communities, on the job and even in our homes. Are we holding our banners high?

- Moses was not alone. Aaron and Hur stood with him, not as critics or instructors but they offered support – they helped when Moses needed it. They were keenly aware of what happened when Moses' hands drooped. They didn't chastise him because his hands were weak or tell him to keep them up – they knew victory was at

stake and lent their support. Who do you have around you? Do they support you when you need it?

Today we are faced with a raging battle around us. Sin is threatening to overtake God's people and the world as we know it. Our God is the same God who supported the Israelites. He will support us too. He is calling us to play our part. Will you be a foot soldier or will you stand on the mountain? Regardless of where you answer the call, let us rally together, support one another and ensure that the battle is won in Jesus' name. God has promised victory; let's play our part.

# **The Sky in Pretty Colours**

The words "Lord put a hand" are often uttered in times of distress. They imply that in the midst of the loss of a job, life-threatening diagnosis, parents' divorce or death of loved ones, God's hands seem withdrawn. This phrase reveals a major misconception we have about God and exposes our internal questioning: "Where are you God?" That is what it really says. It says that we feel forsaken and forgotten. While these feelings are valid, they are not a replication of the reality. The disappearing act is in our nature, not God's. The Lord is not slack concerning his promises and He promised to never leave us (2 Peter 3:9, Hebrews 13:5).

Have you ever taken the time to watch the sun set? How can you doubt whether God's hands are still at work when you see daily, the sun disappear into the sea, the way it mysteriously levitates during the day, and then at dusk, slowly melts before your eyes? Almost simultaneously, hues of blue, pink, orange and/or even purple paint the sky. They are left as traces of the phenomenon that we often take for granted. Then in a matter of seconds everything dissolves leaving a black canvas ready for another kind of masterpiece.

Whenever I am able to witness the painting of such masterpieces as sunsets, I feel blessed because others pay hefty sums to see the handiwork of famous artists. There is just something about the sky being in pretty colours that excites me and I must photograph it. However, pictures can never fully capture its splendour. It is best to simply bask in its beauty yourself.

When you can't seem to find God's hand in your life, look up. David did this. The Psalms are an overwhelming testament that he did. David had his fair share of distress, between running from Saul for his life and family disputes, but he knew that the hand of God who could paint the sky in pretty colours was always there, always working for his children (Ps. 8:3-4). I have realized that when we are plagued with pain and hopelessness, we need more than ever to stand beneath the heavens, to set our gaze to the skies in pretty colours. Indeed, they do proclaim the glorious work of the Lord's hands.

Jahzara Johnson, who hailed from Grenada, spiced up the challenge, first with her poem, **Do the right to your delight**, based on Psalm 1, and also served up a spoken word piece entitled **Sweet Bread** that left listeners not only yearning for a slice of the favourite Caribbean dessert but a healthy portion of the Bread of Life.

It was no surprise that she was awarded a gold medal for that delicious slice of sweet bread and a silver medal for her poem.

Fellow under-13 challenger Neliah Homeward of Tobago did not disappoint as she offered her poem *The Beauty in One's Name* with much style and grace to capture a bronze medal.

The challenge only got better with the challengers in the 14 to 18 category.

Sixteen-year-old Gabrielle Murray from Tobago who has loved poetry from the time she was a child, enthralled her listeners with *How Long* to gain a gold award.

Fellow Tobagonian Iretiola Ogiste demonstrated the power of language in her spoken word piece based on the shortest Psalm - Psalm 117 - in which she examined what is praise, who should be praised. She convinced listeners that all praises must go to Almighty God who loves, blesses and sustains his people. A gold medal was her award.

The four challengers in the over-19 category brought a fitting end to the inspiring display of talent.

Sherese Moore-Beckles of Tobago warmed the hearts of the listeners with her poem based on Psalm 11:1-6, in which she enticed them to serve God first and faithfully. She gained a bronze award.

Cassie Murrel of Grenada, a college student, showcased a range of skills, adding her singing talent to her poem, *Shaken, But Not forgotten*. She copped a silver medal for ably advising listeners to delve into God's word and

connect with Him to overcome times of fear and trouble.

The penultimate presentation, the poem, **the Scoffer**, delivered by Karis George of the North Caribbean Conference took the challenge to a whole new level with her passionate, lyrical delivery. She deserved gold as awarded by the judges.

Rounding off the evening with a thoughtprovoking spoken word piece was the lone male, Alex Murrell. He copped a silver medal for admonishing listeners to pay attention to the signs all around that Jesus is coming soon and to be prepared.

Chief Judge Derron Sandy commended all the performers for their quality presentations and encouraged youth across the region to get involved in sharing their authentic Caribbean talents to glorify our awesome God.

# DEDICATED, COMMITTED, UNITED AMID THE CRISIS ADVENTURERS LAUNCH ELECTRONIC MAGAZINE

The Youth Ministries Department of the South Leeward Conference (SLC) is on the move as it officially launched its electronic magazine, the "Antigua & Barbuda Adventurers on the Move" quarterly magazine. The virtual event which took place on July 10, 2021, was carried on the Adventurers' YouTube channel and Facebook page.

Antigua & Barbuda Adventurers on the Move is a ministry that was developed because it was felt that the Church's youth were not being catered for and that there are not enough programs planned with them in mind. The ministry hopes to cauterize the leak in the retention statistics through initiatives like the magazine.

Leaders in the Adventurers' ministry officiated in the launch. Counselor Lindale Daniel welcomed the listening and viewing audience and highlighted, in the opening remarks, the aim of the magazine. Assistant Island Coordinator Maribane Romeo asked God's blessings and guidance on every child, parent, counselor, director, area coordinator, island coordinator, youth director and anyone remotely connected to the Adventurers youth ministry.

- organizing a YouTube channel where children can upload their Bible stories
- consulting the General Conference's Children's Ministries website for tips and tools to enhance the quality of the programs the department produces

Another item of special music was music was rendered by the Seaglans Central Seventh-day Adventist Church. Following this, Sean Joseph, graphic designer of the magazine, gave a page-by-page review to the viewing audience. He encouraged the parents to download the activity pages which are loaded with fun activities for the boys and girls.

After Mr. Joseph's presentation, Dr. Carson Greene, president of the conference, hinted that there was a tinge of envy that this was not an adult magazine. Dr. Greene later consecrated the magazine asking God to let it be a blessing to boys and girls everywhere. Finally, Island Coordinator Loy Weste ended the launch by thanking the chief contributors and again asking the Lord to continue to keep His guiding hand on the magazine.

# DEDICATED, COMMITTED, UNITED AMID THE CRISIS **ST. CROIX CENTRAL CHURCH CELEBRATES A SIGNIFICANT ANNIVERSARY**

#### How It All Began:

On October 30, 2021, exactly fifty years since the baptism that marked its birth in 1971, Pastor Thomas Rose welcomed members and friends of Central Church in St. Croix who had gathered to give God glory for what He has done. The celebration was held on the exact "sacred spot" in Estate Calquhoun in St. Croix where fifty years ago members of Christiansted and Faith churches along with our Spanish brethren had pitched a tent to hold an evangelistic campaign. The Virgin Islands were considered difficult terrain for evangelism, but the leaders pressed on in faith. Pastor Kembleton S. Wiggins (now deceased) from the East Caribbean Conference was the evangelist. Pastor Steve Willsey, the senior pastor, led out in organizing the campaign, and Pastor Reginald Michael, the intern, was in charge of preparing the field. At that first baptism on October 30, 1971, two hundred and twenty-six precious souls were baptized. It was the start of what would be Central Church.

#### **Memories and Testimonies:**

Dr. Lloyd Henry, a member of the planning committee, spoke of the excitement as the tent went up on September 12, 1971, and of non-Adventists stopping to give a hand and then inviting people to the meetings. He mentioned the thrill of seeing on opening night - September 26, 1971 - visitors in a school bus rented by a church member to bring guests to the meetings. He admitted that he realized that "something big" was about to happen. One of the original ushers, Mary Kent, even dressed in her usher uniform and described the journey her life took, bringing her back to recommitting her life to Jesus again. The praise team sang the original theme song, "Since Jesus Came into my Heart" with voices a little older but still with the fervor of youth.

Testimonies flowed - Alvira Brooks described how she was invited to attend and did so with her husband, now deceased. She and Ophelia Walter, both still faithful members, helped swell the ranks of the St. Croix Seventh-day Adventist school, whose enrollment almost doubled as the children of the new believers joined their peers there. Whole families joined the school, like the Freemans with their seven, and the Christophers with their five.

#### **History Lessons:**

Karon Reynolds presented the church's history in prose (written by Annette Michael) and Jada Patrick and Reuben Christian re-echoed the events in poetry (written by Pastor/poet Maurice Andrews) These youthful presentations helped to take our memories back "to the place where we first received the message." No one could forget the mud; September and October being the rainy months. Yet, there was standing room only even as the rain poured down on the leaky tent.

Pastor Reginald Michael, now a retiree, shared some of his early memories of preparing the field for the crusade, and talked about the challenge of locating the right spot. He told of the excitement of learning evangelistic methods from the evangelist, Kem Wiggins. He also had for "show and tell" two of the original bumper stickers, one of which said, "Follow Me to the Big Green Tent". Pastor Michael was one of the eight pastors involved in baptizing groups of 8 in that October 30, 1971 baptism.

Although two hundred and twenty-six souls were baptized that Sabbath afternoon at the Altona lagoon in Christiansted, by the time the baptisms were over the following year, the number of new believers was 323, and a whole new and growing church, Central Church, was born. Pastor Michael had been assigned by the Conference President W. W. Thompson to shepherd the young flock who, without a church home, were worshipping in leaky tents, in the wilderness and in Christiansted, before they purchased a plot and built a church home in Estate Plessen.

#### **Passing the Baton:**

This October 2021 celebration, organized by Pastor Claudette Andrews, is really the celebration of that first baptism in 1971, her own baptism. Pastor Andrews, now a (retired) commissioned minister of the gospel, has also been an evangelist, leading men and women up and down the Caribbean to Christ, just as she was led 50 years ago. Elder Steve Roberts, another October 30, 1971 baptized member, has been preaching on the local TV station for over 14 years. Elder New Jacob, another member of the 1971 group, is an international evangelist, taking the Word of God to distant lands. Seeds planted 50 years ago have sprouted and are bearing fruit.

Central Church's membership doubled by 1977, the year of dedication of the church, and continued to grow although it helped give birth to Hope and Bethel churches. It is the largest church in St. Croix and one of the largest in the North Caribbean Conference. In spite of COVID- 19, Pastor Andrews has hinted that the celebrations will continue, for there are so many other dates in Central's 50-year history to celebrate including the official organization of the church in April 1972, the breaking of ground, and the dedication of the church.

# Vision for a National Community Services Centre

# GOD PLACED A DREAM ...VIP MOMS...

Out of concern for a young, single mother who had to convert her growing baby's onesies into vests and who had reached to the point of not being able to purchase disposable diapers for her little one, a thought was planted in the mind of Jamila Nicholls. Jamila Nicholls is the Women's Ministries director of the Tobago Mission of Seventh-day Adventists, this being just one of the many hats she wears at the Mission. The thought lingered for months, but by October 2020, the season came to get the seed planted. Mrs. Nicholls was inspired to use the acronym V.I.P. MOMS to name her project: 'V' Vests, 'I' Inspirational, 'P' Pampers (meaning disposable diapers), and MOMS, the name of the beautiful mothers that she sought to serve. The inspiration was pivotal to guiding this new ministry because its purpose, from inception, was to encourage and inspire the MOMS with scriptural texts and other inspirational literature that would assist in the proper rearing of their young ones. An executive committee of seven (7) was formed, comprising the C.E.O., Mrs. Nicholls; a chairperson, Mrs. Sharon Job-Edwards; and five (5) other Women's Ministries leaders. God has blessed the executive with four additional ladies, since our launch in December 2020, and this committee meets virtually, as much as needs be, to plan for the various distributions (what, how and when).

The Bible expounds that the cattle on a thousand hills are God's. We have not killed any cattle to offset expenses, but God has provided donors to fuel this glorious initiative. Every month, a sum in the vicinity of TT\$12,000.00 is contributed/raised. Contributors from various walks and professions make online and direct payments to the Mission - some \$100, some \$500, and some \$1 000. Some donate the proceeds from the sale of their avocados. This revenue is paid into the V.I.P. MOMS account. As a result of the generous hearts within and without the church, our first launch served fifty-six (56) mothers and as of September 2021, we have passed the 100 mark of mothers helped.

This God-birthed effort, this faith-moving exercise has opened the way for many other ministries. By faith, babies have been dedicated; clothing, shoes, walkers, and car seats have been distributed; food hampers have been served; medical assistance to V.I.P. MOMS has been given. By faith, Bible classes and prayer rooms have been opened; baptisms have been conducted; counselling sessions have been provided; parenting seminars are being conducted by professionals and pastors across the Tobago Mission and even the Caribbean Union. By faith, gifts from as far as Miami and New York are being mailed and/wire transferred. By faith we hope to see mothers gainfully employed so that they can meet their children's basic needs; by faith we want to see the fathers returning to take their rightful position in the homes. By faith, we see this concept being embraced by all Missions/Conferences, Unions and Divisions, so that all the world will know that we all care, and that Jesus is soon to return to this earth.

I never knew her to be a grumbler or complainer, but she would respectfully let me know how she felt about an issue. She is a woman of quality and faith, who cares about family and friends."

Another former Union director, Dr. Samuel Telemaque remembers Marie as empowering everyone around her. "She empowered me with her wise counsel, positive attitude, and her participation in all major events. She gave me an excellent orientation to directorship at the level of the Union. Sister Lawrence's empowerment ministry made us effective leaders in service of the Lord. We celebrate her for her excellent ministry of empowerment."

On August 1, 2021, Marie George-Lawrence retired from the service of the Caribbean Union Conference, but not from active service of the Lord. Armed with several projects to keep her occupied, she continues to allow God to use her wherever He sees fit.

Faith Pustam-Ramdath was asked to fill the very large shoes that Marie George-Lawrence has left behind. Faith began services in the organization on January 16, 2000. She served in the Ministerial and Family Ministries Departments and then relocated to the Suriname Mission with her husband to give missionary service during the period 1st April 2012 - 28th February, 2014.

On returning to the Union office in 2014, Faith was assigned to the Publishing Ministries and Stewardship Departments where she lent her creativity and organizational skills to assisting the respective directors to professionally conduct their programs.

Her reliance on God has forged her watch words: "You have the power to say this is NOT how my story will end." She has seen God at work in her life and already her creativity is being felt around the Caribbean. As she has joined the president's team to continue giving her faithful service, we wish her every blessing.
